Madison Square Boys & Girls Club is a place of hope for the 5,000 kids we serve each year. The hope that we offer our kids, would not be possible without the insurmountable support we receive from donors and supporters like you each year.

It is because of the tremendous support of our partners that we are able to embark on the next chapter of Madison's history. We are pleased to announce that we will be opening a new flagship location in Harlem, NY in the fall of 2018.

As you will see in the following pages, we have many success stories and reasons to feel good about the impact Madison makes on the lives of thousands of youth each and every day.

During the 2015–2016 academic year, we saw the following successes:

- **84% of our members engaged in regular, moderate-to-physical activity**
- **We served approximately 80,000 hot meals and 40,000 healthy snacks**
- **100% of our high school seniors in the Project Graduate program graduated from high school, compared to a New York City average of 64% &**
- **College Success participants are persisting in college at a rate of 89%**

We are proud of the accomplishments of our members, but we know that our work is never ending. There are more youth in this City who need our services, and even as we provide life-changing programs to our members, our facilities are aging and in need of repair. Thus, the concept of 'building hope' is taking on a new life at Madison as the tagline for our campaign to raise important funds for three distinct purposes:

1. **Build a new Clubhouse in Harlem**
2. **Establish a capital improvements fund for renovations at our existing Clubhouses, and**
3. **Raise general endowment funds to support and enhance our ability to deliver our outcome-driven programs year after year without interruption**

The three initiatives will not only allow us to serve more youth, but also secure our future operations, allowing us to remain a positive and welcoming force for youth, deeply embedded in the fabric of New York City. Please stay tuned for more information on this Campaign in the months to follow.

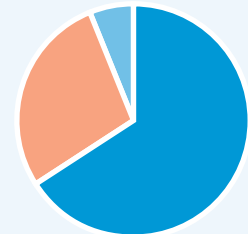

EXPLORERS ACADEMY

Eight year-old Gianna has been a member of the Thomas S. Murphy Clubhouse for two years. During her time at the Clubhouse, Gianna has grown her love of science. Our DIY STEM and Summer Brain Gain programs have helped Gianna continue to explore her interests in this field. Gianna states that she loves science because she likes to discover new things by experimenting.

In addition to homework help, STEM programming, and all the other activities the Clubhouse offers, Gianna loves to spend time in the dance studio and has participated in many of the Clubhouses' dance and theater performances.

Gianna's mother states, "I have seen Gianna grow socially, emotionally and academically.

Gianna is more confident and less timid now after being at the Clubhouse.

Gianna was extremely shy but now she has the ability to perform in front of crowds of people. I think the Thomas S. Murphy Clubhouse is a wonderful place for all children."

PROFILE WALIDA ALI

2015 Youth of the Year Walida Ali is now a 19 year-old freshman at New York University. A member of the Navy Yard Clubhouse since age 6, Walida is a shining example of the impact that our programs and services have on New York City youth.

Walida describes her time at the Clubhouse as critical to her success. Growing up in the Farragut Housing Development across from the Clubhouse gave Walida a perspective different from many other young people her age.

"I've lived in Farragut since I was four years old and through the years of gentrification, I have noticed a huge disparity in wealth. I wish that the reality of the disparities was not so harsh, but every day I see the look of people who have money versus people who do not have money. It's a constant battle of worth. The lasting effects of economic disparity are one of the most challenging issues facing young people in American when there are so many insurmountable odds."

Walida's statement perfectly describes the reasons why Madison's Clubhouses are so important. Our three-phase educational plan provides a seamless framework of quality educational programs that engage our youth in learning as early as possible, and keeps them on a positive academic track as they transition through school and on to college. Walida understands the importance of this work and gives back by volunteering her time at the Clubhouse.

We are proud of Walida and all of our members who have successfully earned a high school diploma and transitioned into the real world. "One of the most important things about the Club is that everyone wants to see each and every one of the members that walks through its doors succeed. That is the type of environment that makes the Clubhouse unique."

Maylynn believes without a doubt that the Club has helped broaden her perspective on life and reach toward academic success. The College Success Initiative has been especially important to her and has fostered ability to do well in college. She says, "The College Success Coordinator not only cares about how well I am doing academically, but also assists me with financial aid needs."

Columbus Clubhouse Youth of the Year **Daquan Saxon** attends SUNY Canton. Daquan has been thriving in college

and has stayed in touch with many of his friends at the Clubhouse. He is majoring in Criminal Investigation and wants to become a Forensic Scientist who solves cold cases.

Navy Yard Youth of the Year **Kayla Williams** was just a junior in high school when she was selected to represent her Clubhouse. Today, she is a high school senior and working to apply to various colleges. Over the past year, Kayla has maintained her passion for helping others.

About the Program: The premier national recognition program for Boys & Girls Club members, it celebrates youth who have overcome enormous odds and demonstrate exceptional character and leadership skills. The program promotes service to the Club, the importance of community and family, academic success, strong moral character, and life goals.

PASSPORT TO MANHOOD

Dayquan has been a member of the Smilow Clubhouse for seven years. His favorite subject in school is English. He has aspirations of going to college and becoming a physical therapist. Dayquan emphatically believes that his time at the Clubhouse has taught him values that will be beneficial later in life. Of the Passport to Manhood program, Dayquan says, "It has taught me how to conduct myself as a mature young man. I have learned to see that light at the end of the tunnel and how to be optimistic despite any obstacles that I may endure."

Clubhouse staff has watched Dayquan mature in many ways, but most especially in his confidence and in the way he treats others. Dayquan is considerate of other people's feelings, lends a hand when he can, and understands the value of his word.

About Passport to Manhood: The passage from boyhood to manhood is challenging, requiring adolescent males to understand and manage many issues and transitions. Passport to Manhood addresses critical issues that young men face during this time, such as ethics, decision making, wellness, employment and careers, cooperation and conflict, diversity, relationships and self-esteem.

Clubhouse staff has observed Skylar develop into a great leader amongst her peers, and she is quickly maturing into a well-respected young lady.

About SMART Girls: SMART Girls is a health, fitness, prevention/education and self-esteem enhancement program for girls. The program is designed to encourage healthy attitudes and lifestyles that will enable adolescent girls to develop to their full potential.

BUILDING HOPE

THE CAMPAIGN FOR OUR FUTURE

Madison's Clubhouses are at the heart of what we do. Our Clubs are communities and second homes for thousands of kids and teens throughout New York City – and we work hard to provide a safe, welcoming, and inspiring environment for them to call their own.

Our capital and endowment campaign is a \$90 million initiative – the largest in Madison's history – that will support those children and young adults citywide. We are building our fifth and largest Clubhouse in the northernmost part of central Harlem, one of New York City's most underserved neighborhoods, designed to give thousands of Harlem youth a chance to experience all the opportunities Madison offers. We will establish a Capital Improvements Fund to secure and renovate the infrastructure of our existing four Clubs in Brooklyn and the Bronx, and we will increase our endowment to underpin our growth.

In 2016, Rogers Partners completed the final designs for the Harlem Clubhouse, which will be constructed in 2017 and 2018. Located on Bradhurst Avenue at 155th Street, the new Clubhouse will offer amenities and activities to serve more than 400 children and teens every day. It will also serve as the new Administrative Headquarters for Madison Square Boys & Girls Club, allowing staff and organizational leadership to be closely connected with Clubhouse members and Clubhouse operations. With modern educational spaces, a regulation basketball court and fitness center, rooftop soccer field, teen center, technology lab, and performing arts spaces, the Harlem Clubhouse will address a critical need for a youth center in north Central Harlem and become a point of pride for the entire community.
